Dear Friends,

It is great to be back at St. Matthew's after my sabbatical. I am tremendously grateful to the parish and especially the vestry and staff for supporting me in my request to have this three-month sabbatical. I come back refreshed and with greater clarity of purpose. I had high hopes for my sabbatical; what actually happened surpassed them all. No kidding! The backbone of the sabbatical was three separate weeks in solitude, for study, writing, and exercise at Topsail Beach. In between these retreats, I was able to give more time to my family. We even enjoyed a week in Boston, visiting churches and museums through Holy Week. Throughout the sabbatical, I indulged in a great deal of physical exercise. (I'm fitter now than I've been in years!) *On May 12th I will host a Sunday Forum to report back more fully on my sabbatical*.

Countless people showed up and pitched in to meet the needs of this time. We must be especially grateful to The Rev. Lisa Frost-Phillips, Associate Rector, and Madeline Liddicoat, Senior Warden, for leading the parish through the Annual Parish Meeting, Lent, Holy Week, and the start of the Easter Season – no small task! They were fantastic. Every member of the staff put in extra work to cover for my absence and several lay leaders took parish ministries forward. I was glad to hear that The Rev. Dr. Eastman's course on St. Paul has attracted great and ongoing interest, and I understand that our guest preachers and celebrants did a fantastic job. Thank you to all of you!

The Vestry hoped that my sabbatical would be a time when the laity in the parish would grow in their

responsibilities in and ownership of the parish, and that seems to have happened. As St. Matthew's grows and our programs diversify, Lisa and I, your clergy, will of necessity be less directly involved in our ministries and programs; our ministry will become more that of identifying and supporting your ministries. It seems my sabbatical has accelerated this process. I come back to a parish that has grown in my absence, that is brimming with vitality and vibrancy, and to new faces on Sunday.

In a few weeks, we will celebrate Pentecost, commonly called "the birthday of the Church." For the seven weeks following Easter, the

disciples had been praying, wondering, witnessing to the Resurrection of Jesus, understanding that his rising from the dead vindicates him as God's Word, fully expressive of God's Way of Being in a single, specific human life. Jesus is thus, as we say, 'Lord and Judge.' On Pentecost the Holy Spirit descended on this fallible and faithful, doubting and jubilant group of women and men, giving them particular gifts for ministry in the newly created Church. They were filled with new enthusiasm, new passion, and new knowledge of God. They were dispossessed of themselves and sent into new intimacy with people all over the earth. The Spirit gave them a share in Jesus' life and a share in his death. They thus began to co-operate with God in God's mission to draw all of humanity into union with Godself.

In these last weeks before Pentecost, I will pray for St. Matthew's that the opening provided by my sabbatical might prove also an opening for the Holy Spirit, for each of us to be touched by a sense of God's closeness and a sense of how we as individuals and as a parish are called to co-operate, like those first apostles, in God's mission to restore humanity to unity with itself and with God. Please join me in this prayer:

O God, who on the first Pentecost taught the hearts of your faithful people by sending to them the light of your Holy Spirit: Grant us at St. Matthew's, by the same Spirit, a clearer judgment in all things, to know and love you more fervently, to give ourselves up more whole-heartedly to your mission, and as we do so, to rejoice in your holy comfort and holy prompting. We ask this through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. [adapted from the collect for Pentecost].



Daughters of the King Discernment Class




Hello everyone! If you missed the Newcomers' coffee, you missed DOK recruiting. We are planning to offer a discernment class to all women interested in committing to our Order.

Lisbon Berry was the son of Rev. Job Berry, founder of Dickerson Chapel A. M. E. Church, and had a close association with St. Matthew's. He even arranged for the wedding of older brother, Richard, and Mildred Whitted to take place in the church.

In addition to being an attorney, Berry was an educator and missionary who founded schools for Black children in Eastern North Carolina, Alabama, and Tennessee.

Springing into Summer











Spring is usually a season that flies by for me. We hit Easter Sunday and then all of a sudden it is summer! Reflecting on my last newsletter article, I believe that honoring the season of Easter has helped slow the Springtime down for us as a family.

It also really helped shape our time in Family Chapel. We began each service with the same words proclaimed in our Sanctuary, "Alleluia Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed, Alleluia!" Followed by Gospel stories that tell of Jesus's work after his resurrection. We have continued to celebrate through joyful songs of praise, acknowledging Easter through our song choices. Family Chapel is a time to worship in way that meets the needs of our youngest as they explore and discover the love of God. It is very much rooted in the Liturgy and mirrors the worship taking place in our Sanctuary.

Our Youth Group spent the Spring diving into and preparing the Youth Service. When

we started the planning process, our teens explored what sentiments and atmosphere they wanted to convey during the service. It was a heartwarming conversation, they wanted parishioners to feel what they feel when they come to youth group: safety, joy, laughter, critical and deep thinking, and interaction. This conversation was eye opening for me. I spent the year planning lessons, focused on how to fit in more Bible study time, to then step back and see that those intentions were just a small slice of the bigger picture. For our teenagers, the feeling of emotional safety was the kicker. By providing time for play, open check-ins, and fellowship over food, the learning and harder questions of faith became easier. When one feels safe, loved, and welcome, there is space for more to enter. I truly see God's grace and love in the interactions of our teenagers, they listen to one another earnestly, ask about each other's challenges, and lighten our moods with jokes and playfulness. One could even say that our youth group is a reflection of our St. Matthew's community at large, welcoming, loving, and ready to embrace the weary. What a blessing to be a part of the St. Matthew's family!

As many of you know, Lazo Lee baby #2 is on the way! I will be on maternity leave from late May to early August. We'll be sure to send pictures when our baby joins the family! Thank you all for your love and support of our family.
