Rector's Sabbatical: January 15 - April 15

As announced first on December 3, Robert+ is going to take a sabbatical from January 15-April 15. During this time he will not be involved in active ministry. Our Associate Rector, the Rev. Lisa Frost-Phillips will assume the role of interim priest-in-charge, with her hours increasing to full time. Lisa will collaborate with Madeline Liddicoat, our Senior Warden, in leading and administrating the parish. While some of Robert's tasks will be set aside, many responsibilities will be picked up by lay leaders in the parish and by our strong group of clergy associates.

As Robert shared in the Sunday announcement:

"This October I engaged Bishop Sam in discussion about

my ministry at St. Matthew's. On one hand, it's been a particularly challenging year with some traumatic

experiences, following on Covid and then rebuilding the parish coming out of Covid. This has led to some inner tiredness. On the other hand, it's been a super rewarding year, seeing the parish continue to come back to life, and putting more and more systems in place to support and nourish that life. It's been particularly meaningful to accompany you all as you accepted Lisa's and my invitation to grow in faith by widening our awareness of our history. That's been truly amazing, and I'm grateful for how God has moved through this place. The parish feels strong. There is a lot of vitality and interest in the air.

What Bishop Sam and I came to, discussing all this, was that after seven and a half years of full time ministry, I was


A Three-Year Celebration of St. Matthew's Bicentennial Kicks Off in 2024

Sacred Ground: New Course starting in January



In January, St. Matthew's will host Sacred Ground, an Episcopal course-sensitive and prayerful- that creates space for sometimes difficult, always respectful dialogue on race and racism. The course invites participants to walk back through history, reflect on family histories and stories, and important narratives that shape our collective story.

Dr. Joseph Riddick will be facilitating the group. There will be eleven sessions beginning Thursday, January 11, 2024 at 6:30 pm. Each session lasts

for 90 minutes. The other sessions are 1/25, 2/8, 2/22, 3/7, 3/21, 4/4, 4/18, 5/2, 5/16, and 5/23. The group will meet virtually each week on the zoom meeting channel.


The curriculum consists of a set of documentary films and short videos, available free to registered participants, that are viewed prior to each session. A set of readings and study materials for each session will be sent to participants. There are two books that are required: "Waking Up White" by Debby Irving and "Jesus and the Disinherited" by Howard Thurman.


The Triumph of Grace: Encountering God's Love through Reading Paul's Letter to the Romans.

Liturgically Speaking: Embracing Sacred Rhythms - Reclaiming the Daily Office



In the Episcopal Church, the concept of the Daily Office holds a unique significance, deeply rooted in the rich tapestry of liturgical tradition. Reclaiming the Daily Office, as understood within the Episcopal tradition, involves a deliberate return to sacred rhythms and practices that have sustained the faithful for centuries. This article explores the spiritual dimensions of the Daily Office, its historical context, and how individuals can reclaim this ancient practice in their contemporary lives.

The Daily Office, also known as the Divine Office or the Liturgy of the Hours, is a set of prayers and readings designed to sanctify different times of the day. Rooted in the monastic tradition, the Episcopal Church has embraced this practice to sanctify time and infuse the daily routine with moments of prayer, reflection, and connection with the divine.

The Daily Office finds its roots in the early Christian monastic communities, where monks would gather at various hours throughout the day to engage in communal prayer and worship. The practice evolved over centuries, becoming a structured liturgy that encompasses morning prayer, noonday prayer, evening prayer, and compline. In the Episcopal tradition, the Book of Common Prayer serves as a guide for these Offices, providing a framework for communal and individual worship.

Reclaiming the Daily Office in Modern Life

Embrace the Liturgical Calendar - The liturgical calendar, with its seasons and feasts, provides a framework for the Daily Office. Reclaiming this tradition involves aligning one's prayer life with the ebb and flow of the liturgical year, recognizing the significance of each season and allowing it to shape spiritual practices.

Establish a Routine of Prayer - Reclaiming the Daily Office requires a commitment to regular prayer. Establish a routine that incorporates morning, noon, and evening prayer. This intentional rhythm helps create a sacred cadence to the day, fostering a sense of continuity with the broader Christian community.

Use the Book of Common Prayer - The Book of Common Prayer serves as a valuable resource for those seeking to reclaim the Daily Office. Utilize its structured prayers, psalms, and readings as a guide for daily worship. The familiarity of these liturgical elements connects individuals across time and space within the Episcopal tradition.

Create Sacred Spaces - Designate physical spaces for prayer within daily life. Whether at home or work, having a sacred space can help signal a transition from the mundane to the sacred, fostering an environment conducive to prayer and reflection.

Engage in Community at St. Matthew's - While the Daily Office can be a deeply personal practice, it is also communal. Both Morning and Compline is offered each week at St. Matthew's. Morning Prayer

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occurs on Wednesdays and Fridays at 8am, with Compline at 8pm Monday - Friday. (See below for more information about these opportunities for communal prayer.). Our Third Sunday Liturgies at 4pm are another way of praying the Daily Office. These services take place during Evening Prayer.

The Daily Office at St. Matthew's

As the year begins and we consider making New Year's resolutions, I would like to encourage you to join the St. Matthew's community in praying the Daily Office. We gather on the Zoom Worship channel several times a week to pray together, offering both intercessions and thanksgivings.

Compline is offered **Monday through Friday at 8:30 pm.** This brief service lasts about 15 minutes and is a wonderful way to prayerfully end the day. All are welcome to participate as often as you like. We follow the service in the Book of Common Prayer and have a time of silent or spoken prayer each evening.

Morning Prayer is offered on Wednesday and Friday mornings at 8:00 am and lasts about 30 minutes. We read scripture from the daily lectionary, share joys and concerns, and pray together. If there's a remembrance of a particular saint that day, we often learn a bit about them. It's a great way to check in with a small community a couple of times a week, and we have formed some great friendships over the years. All are welcome to join us.

Finally, a time of *Morning Silence* if offered on *Tuesday mornings at 7:30 am*. This contemplative time does not follow the liturgy of a particular office. Instead, different participants facilitate a time for meditation with readings or prayer, and the gathering lasts about 20 minutes.

All of these gatherings take place on the *St. Matthew's Zoom Worship channel*. Please consider taking part in one or more of these offerings in 2024. You are always welcome to be a part of these prayerful communities. - *Jill Hofler*

Church Emergency Preparedness: AEDs Installed

As our church family grows and our facilities are being used more frequently, the vestry has begun to examine our preparedness for emergencies. One such emergency would be an individual having a sudden cardiac arrest. To help our parish be better prepared for such an event, the Vestry authorized the purchase of *two automated external defibrillators (AEDs)* which have been installed - one in the parish house (above the fire extinguisher which is next to the side door) and one in the Hayden building (in the hallway outside the kitchen).



The chance of survival from cardiac arrest decreases each minute treatment is delayed. The use of an AED is essential to treatment. While the AEDs we purchased can be used by anyone without any prior training, we are planning opportunities for our community to become more familiar with our AEDs as well as CPR. Look for additional announcements as we firm up plans. In the meantime, please take a moment note the location of our AEDs and become familiar them by viewing this video: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=J_lmwURMHgo. As noted in the video, here are the basic steps to follow if the AEDs need to be used:

- 1. Call (or instruct someone to call) 911. Ideally a bystander can place the call while you stay with the person in distress.
- 2. Retrieve the closest AED by opening the door to the box and removing the device.
- 3. Turn on the AED and follow the directions.

NOTE: We do not currently have pads for children, but the adult pads can be used on a child by placing one pad between the nipples on the chest and one between the shoulder blades on the back.

The Sacred Harp is a hymnal first published in 1844 and includes music written and collected from 1770 through 1820. This dovetails nicely first year of the parish's Bicentennial Celebration, 2024, which focuses on the years 1750-1850. The hymn book uses "shape note" singing, thus called because the musical notation uses note heads in distinct shapes to aid in sight-reading. All are welcome - donations gladly accepted.
