The "hexachord" referenced in this morning's prelude and postlude is the first six pitches of the modern-day major scale (e.g., c-d-e-f-g-a). This was devised when the 11<sup>th</sup>-century theorist Guido d'Arezzo took the first pitches of each phrase of the hymn to St. John the Baptist, Ut queant laxis (see H-1982 No. 271, "The great forerunner of the morn"), and isolated them into a pattern of rising consecutive pitches, thereby creating the forerunner of our present-day "do-re-mi."
